HISTORY

Marijuana Tax Act of 1937


This act stopped the use of the plant as a recreational drug. (*Slide 5*)

Boggs Act 1951

The Boggs Act in 1951 set mandatory sentences for drug convictions. (*Slide 5*)

Controlled Substances Act 1970

This act categorized drugs on medical usefulness and potential for abuse. Cannabis was listed as a Schedule 1 drug (most restrictive) with heroine and LSD. (*Slide* 5)





<u>California Passes First Medical Marijuana</u> <u>Laws - 1996</u>

Other states began establishing laws permitting marijuana for medical use. (*Slide 5*)

As of February 15, 2022

18 states have legalized medical marijuana and an additional 18 states have legalized medical & recreational marijuana. (*Slide 5*)

<u>Marijuana-Impaired Driving – a Report to</u> <u>Congress</u>

Prepared in accordance with Section 4008 (Marijuana-Impaired Driving) of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act, this report acknowledges what is both known and unknown regarding marijuana impairment and driving, as well as covers some of the challenges of measuring impairment levels in drivers. State laws and crash risks are discussed, and feasibility with regard to training law enforcement to detect marijuana impairment are addressed. (*Slides 22, 48*)

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Compassionate Use Program – Overview (DPS)

The Department of Public Safety operates an online registry of qualified doctors who can prescribe low THC prescriptions to patients who meet the conditions that are defined under Texas's Compassionate Use Program. This registry is available to law enforcement agencies and dispensing organizations. DPS also manages licensing requirements of organizations that dispense low levels of THC cannabis to patients within the Compassionate Use Registry of Texas. (*Slide 36*)

House Bill No. 1235 An Act

This bill passed I the 86^{th} Texas Legislature in 2019, and allows for the cultivation of the Cannabis sativa L. plant with THC content less than 0.3%. (*Slide 37*)

Penal Code Title 10. Offenses Against Public Health, Safety, and Morals. Chapter 49. Intoxication and Alcoholic Beverage Offenses

A person commits an offense if the person is intoxicated while operating a motor vehicle in a public place, and there is no defense for medical use. (*Slide 44*)

Texas Transportation Code Sec. 724.011 Consent to Taking of Specimen

This code reviews that there is implied consent if a person is arrested for an offense while operating a motor-vehicle while intoxicated. (*Slide 44*)
